A century ago Freud declared, "Anatomy is destiny." Since then, conceptions of gender have undergone a profound transformation, now a fluid concept rather than determined. The psychoanalytic psychology of gender is being reworked to incorporate the way

each person expresses and experiences gender as an important aspect of personal and social identity.

In March, our conference Gender 2020: Psychoanalysis Adjusts Its Vision brought together national experts, Jack Drescher, MD and Melanie Suchet, PhD, together with Chicago area clinicians, Robert Galatzer-Levy, MD, Theo Pintzuk, LCSW and Jane Reid, PhD, MSW from the Institute and Kelly Ducheny, PsyD and Sara Hays, LCSW, CADC from Howard Brown Health Center to explore our contemporary knowledge of gender and the implications for psychotherapists. Along with an audience of more than 100 mental health professionals, we reexamined gender from the perspective of 2020. The topics covered ranged from language terminology that recognizes fluidity, rethinking the process of development if gender is not destiny but constructed, the impact of gender shaming and violence on both personal identity and social mores, and enhanced gender sensibility in the

The increased visibility of gender non-binary and transgender people is a welcome human rights movement. It also presents a challenge to our traditional psychoanalytic ideas about gender. This year, the Institute addressed this challenge with our 2019-2020 Continuing Education



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

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NEW EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING:

Integrative Psychoanalytic Couple Therapy and Psychodynamic Psychotherapy Program

This Fall we are introducing two new education programs-Integrative Psychoanalytic Couple Therapy and Psychodynamic Psychotherapy.

Together, the Institute and the Institute for Clinical Social Work (ICSW) have launched a new one-year certificate program in *Integrative Psychoanalytic Couple Therapy*. This specialized training, offered nowhere else in Chicago, is designed to enhance the skills of couple therapists using an integrative psychoanalytic perspective.

Three of Chicago's preeminent couple therapists are the core faculty for the program: **Carla Leone, PhD**, program director, **Arthur Nielsen, MD** and **Karen Bloomberg, PhD**. They will be joined by guest lecturers and expert couple therapists who will provide case consultation for students.

The Institute also now offers a certificate program in *Psychodynamic Psychotherapy* designed specifically to meet the needs of clinicians in the contemporary mental health environment. The 3-year program aims to fill the gap in mental health training and give therapists the tools they need to understand human development and complex psychological phenomenon and help their patients in a deeper and more satisfying way. This redesigned program combines the strengths of the Adult Psychotherapy Program and the Child and Adolescent Psychotherapy in a new format


