Farewell Carolyn






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A CONVERSATION WITH:

DR. BENJAMIN GARBER





Institute faculty member Benjamin Garber published A Child of the Ghetto, a memoir of his childhood escape from Poland's Wilno Ghetto and his struggle to survive the Holocaust. The book is dedicated to Dr. Garber's wife and three daughters who inspired him to document these events as a contribution to preserving an important part of 20th century history.

Recently, Dr. Garber was interviewed about his memoir.

In the beginning of the book, you are 4 years old, and now you are 88. What prompted you to write this autobiography now?

I never spoke of my childhood experiences until an evening when we hosted a Seder, but none of the guests could make it. I decided that, instead of proceeding with the normal holiday rituals, I would share my story with the family. My daughters embraced the story and began encouraging me to document it.

Sharing your story helps others heal, but do you think it helps you as well?

My friend, psychoanalyst Jack Graller, was interviewing Holocaust survivors for a Steven Spielberg production. He asked if I would be willing to share my story and I agreed. But the weeks leading up to our meeting were filled with restless nights and nightmares of Nazis

chasing me. Then, when my interview with Dr. Graller was over, the nightmares stopped and I could sleep again. So, yes, telling my story helps me heal.

Do you feel like your life experiences, particularly your life during the Holocaust, contributed to your becoming a psychoanalyst?

Yes. I was a founder of the Barr-Harris Children's Grief Center. I believe my interests in working with bereaved children is based on my experiences. Each time I work with a bereaved child, I engage in a bit of mourning myself, for the people I have lost. It's work that I enjoy.

How have your experiences help you understand children who have suffered traumatic loss?

I am able to empathize with children in therapy. I quickly pick up on where they are stressed, where they are vulnerable. And, I know exactly at what point, I can make a connection with them. It's a tactic you learn in psychoanalytic training, but I believe my experiences have helped me to pinpoint these areas more easily.

Dr. Garber has a private practice in adult and child psychiatry and psychoanalysis and serves as a Training and Supervising Analyst at the Institute. He was a founder of the Barr-Harris Children's Grief Center, now Child Grief Services, and served as its Director for 17 years. In addition to A Child of the Ghetto, Dr. Garber has published many articles on childhood bereavement and loss. Currently, he is at work on a follow-up memoir about his post-war experience in a displaced persons camp.



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
